Dear Friends,

More Good News for 2010! It is time to gather fruits of the UN International Decade for a Culture of Peace and Non-Violence for the Children of the World, 2001-2010. A youth team including Cecile Barbeito from Spain, Meg Villanueva and Nikki Delfin from the Philippines and Marcos Estrada from Brazil, with help from Dr. David Adams and Professor Alicia Cabezudo, are committed to assuring the End-of-Decade Report from the Civil Society. We ask for volunteers to support the evaluation by mobilizing responses from their own regions or areas of interest.

In the Mid-term evaluation report over 700 organizations from all parts of the world took part in the report, now the aim is to reach 1000, thus volunteers' support will be crucial. The report is to be ready in May 2010, to be submitted to UNESCO. There are individuals and organizations in all parts of the world putting lots of efforts to cultivate a lasting culture of Peace. Examples can be seen in the Culture of Peace Councils in Brazil and other countries, most recently in the city of Santos, in the state of Sao Paulo, where ABrasOFFA (Brazilian Association of Organisers of Folk Festivals and Popular Arts) is working towards the creation of a Culture of Peace Council (See the most recent articles in CPNN ( http://cpnn-world.org ) for examples of these city initiatives).

Good News! The Global Youth Solidarity Fund is now ready to enter its second round of support for youth projects that foster mutual respect, understanding and long-term positive relationships between peoples of different cultures and religions.

We have received the following email from Isabelle Legare of the United Nations Alliance of Civilizations. Please note that since the working language of the Selection Committee is English, all of the supporting documents are in English, and the your applications must be written in English as well. On the other hand, Isabelle can answer your questions in English, French or Spanish.

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"I am very pleased to announce that the United Nations Alliance of Civilizations is launching the second edition of its Youth Solidarity Fund.

As you may know, this program provides seed funding to outstanding youth projects addressing areas of primary concern to the UNAoC, i.e. fostering mutual respect, understanding and long-term positive relationships between peoples of different cultures and religions.

The Youth Solidarity Fund will support several outstanding youth projects demonstrating innovative approaches to building cross-cultural understanding. The 2009 edition of the Youth Solidarity Fund offers a total envelope of up to US\$300,000. There are two levels of funding available:

Small grants: Community or local-level projects needing funding of up to US\$20,000 each.

• Large grants: National or regional-level projects needing funding of up to US\$30,000 each.

A Youth Selection Committee will identify projects deemed to be the most meritorious under each level of funding.

I am inviting eligible youth organizations from all over the world to submit project proposals responding to the criteria outlined in the guidelines. Projects need to be presented via the application form developed for this program...

Please note that the application deadline is September 30, 2009, 1:00 PM, New York time.

### Bulletin of World Report on the Culture of Peace for April/May 2009

Dear Friends,

Over the past few years, I have often been requested to write a book with a strategy for the global movement for a culture of peace. Since I have often been critical of the strategies proposed by others, it has seemed only fair and just that I should propose a strategy myself.

But before writing a strategy for the culture of peace, I found it necessary to write a history and analysis of the culture of war.

I have also tried to imagine how such a strategy could come about over time, and therefore I have also written a utopian novella in which the author looks back from the year 2026 to recall how the transition from culture of war to culture of peace came to pass.

The strategy proposes a new world system to replace the system of nation states that in the course of history has come to monopolize the culture of war. To achieve such a global realignment, civil society organizations such as NGOs should work as much as possible in collaboration with local government. Here is an excerpt from the book explaining the reasons for this:

"It makes sense to redirect the primary emphasis of the civil society toward working together with elected officials at the local level. That does not mean abandoning completely their national and international work, which will continue to help restrain the culture of war at that level. But it does mean a radical shift of emphasis and priorities if we are to arrive at a culture of peace.

First, by working together with local elected officials the civil society can achieve the legitimacy of working for the people as a whole, and it increases the possibility of broadening the base of involvement to include everyone in the community.

Second, by working together with local elected officials, the civil society can find common ground, above the level of their competition for limited resources...

Third, by working together on the culture of peace, the civil society organizations that would normally concentrate on their own particular area, can now take part in a more holistic and mutually-reinforcing approach.

Fourth, by putting energy into local government, they can help build the base for a new world system that is free from the culture of war."

### Bulletin of World Report on the Culture of Peace for February/March 2009

**Dear Friends**,

Many of you responded to my question about going to the World Social Forum in Belem, but only a few of you came to the Forum, and only a few of us were able to meet there. In fact, the Forum had very little presence of the culture of peace. Even the organizations from Brazil that were represented in the 2005 World Report were mostly absent.

Despite this, the Forum was very important and inspirational (see the CPNN article at http://cpnn-world.org/cgi-bin/read/articlepage.cgi?ViewArticle=432 ), with a leadership role for the indigenous peoples and a strong presence of youth.

In addition to the article about the Forum, CPNN has received seven other new articles which are listed below.

In response to the call for suggestions about follow-up to the International Decade, we have received a number of very interesting and informative replies:

- According to Michel Cibot of the Association Francaise des Communes, Départements et Régions pour la Paix, it would be useful to follow-up with a Decade for Disarmament. He says that "In any case, we will have international campaigns such as that of Mayors for Peace that will enable us to maintain contact with institutions even if the economic and financial crisis forces us to take up other priorities."

- Joe DeRivera of Clark University in the US suggests that we should publicize the scholarly work that the culture of peace concept has generated, and to "present the tools that different people believe may be used to build a culture of peace."

- Nina Goncharova, president of the Siberian center for Eurasian projects, suggests " a Women for a New World Vision meeting together with heads of the states to bring the male / female balance for the planet of culture of peace." She also suggests a "Theatre of New Time world tour to become a real international voice for culture of peace by means of media & arts - all countries who are interested in hosting this international art event are welcome to cooperation."

- Denis Alberto Torres, Director of the Martin Luther King Institute in Nicaragua, reminds us that, in response to their request, this year has been declared by the United Nations as the International Year of Reconciliation, which is complementary to the culture of peace. He would would like to help develop programming and networks such as those for the culture of peace and to disseminate through our networks the Declaration of the General Assembly of the United Nations so that its call for reconciliation is taken up by governments and the civil society. - Helena Lourenco, from the IOV South America (International Organization of Folk Art), reminds us that "we will hold a major Peace Congress in the Americas, for which

information is available at http://www.abrasoffa.org.br/ "

- Irene Hadjidakis - van Schagen writes from the Netherlands: "Let us invite elders from all kind of indigenous peoples around the globe to be our elders too. Let us invite them to celebrate the International day of Peace with us in front of the peace palace at the Hague, or maybe even inside, together with the judges of the International Court of Justice and ask them to be consultants in our disputes. I think they are the best teachers to educate us to listen to understand again, to preserve the planet, to respect all life and share with others."

- David Inkey writes from the United States: "Let us examine the first known peace treaty on earth, the treaty of kadesh, 1269 b.c.....and prepare all of our peace study programs to study it now and to prepare programs bridging from the end of the decade for the culture of peace to 2031.....the presumed 3300th anniversary of the treaty of kadesh, not allowing any calendar corrections in that long expanse crammed with so many skirmishes, conflicts, battles, war and rumors of war."
